## **ROUTE CARD 4- CIRCULAR WALK FROM ESHTON THROUGH GAMBERS WOOD.**

APPROXIMATE TIME 1 HR 40 MINUTES( 7 KM ), GENTLE CLIMBS, TOO LONG FOR YOUNG WALKERS.

USE OUTDOOR LEISURE MAP 2 - YORKSHIRE DALES SOUTHERN & WESTERN AREAS, SCALE 4CM:1KM

## **PENNINE WAY**

Totaling 268 miles in length the Pennine Way was the first official long distance footpath to be opened ( 24<sup>th</sup> April 1965), and is undoubtedly the best known. It follows the central upland spine of England north from Edale in Derbyshire to Yetholm just over the Scottish border.
